

Great exam results for 2019

Lucton's Year 11 pupils achieved 83% with 5 or more passes at GCSE and 73% for 5 passes including English and Maths. Again this year, sciences did very well at Lucton and the separate science subjects were amongst many subjects that achieved a 100% pass rate.



Lucton's leavers, also performed well, delivering an excellent set of A Level results. With just over 20 candidates, this year's cohort achieved results ahead of their predicted grades. Enbo and Lek led the way with A*AAB and A*ABB respectively and will be going on to

study at UCL and Manchester. Over a quarter of all exams taken achieved A* and A grades and over half were A* to B grades – excellent results from a non-selctive cohort!



The Watts' LEJOG ride

The beginning of August saw the Watts Family start their Lands End to John O Groats Bike Challenge. The first day began with some of the toughest climbs of the entire route but these came with rewarding views of the impressive coastline, St. Michael's Mount and finished on the edge of Dartmoor.

Day two was another grippy day on the bike with the magnificent climb of Cheddar Gorge finally arriving in the stunning city of Bath.

The following day skirted the Cotswolds before crossing the sweeping expanse of the Bristol Channel on the Severn Bridge. Then onto one of the most beautiful sections of the ride along the River Wye finishing in the market town of Ludlow. Day 4 was the Ludlow to Oswestry 50 mile Bike Challenge with 15 other riders joining this section of the Watts Family journey. Finishing the ride at HOPE HOUSE and meeting some of the children there was a fitting end to the day's efforts. The next day's riding began through the Shropshire and Cheshire plains. In the afternoon the landscape became more suburban as the route passed between Manchester and Liverpool ending North of Preston. This was the first experience of the extremes of weather to come with thunder, lightning and torrential rain. The sixth day saw both the weather and scenery improve with views towards the Pennines and then North onto the mighty Lake District and the steady but long climb of Shap Fell. Onwards through Penrith and Carlisle and finally across the boarder at Gretna Green and into Scotland. Day 7 saw the family push on through the lowlands with a steady climb to Edinburgh, an epic crossing over the iconic Forth River Bridge before finishing at Lock Levan for a well-earned rest. By now the legs and lungs had become accustomed to the daily work out and just in time before tackling the mighty Highlands.

Day 8 started with a Yellow Weather Warning of high winds and heavy rain. This only added to the challenge of riding into the stunning Grampian Mountains through the Cairngorms National Park and tackling the tough climbs of the mighty Glenshee and infamous Lecht Hill ski resorts without the snow and the toughest day so far!

After a good night's sleep and a hearty Scottish breakfast, the family was again ready to tackle whatever the route and weather had instore. The start of the day passing Culloden and on to Inverness was cool and undulating and by the end of the day was in the remotest and most spectacular part of Scotland.

The morning of the final day, although a damp and cold start, did not give up the little surprise instore until reaching the rugged North Atlantic Coast. Then the weather unleashed all it had in seemingly a last attempt to stop the destination of John O Groats being reached. Gusts of 60 mph made progress very tough and cold and the finish line that little bit sweeter. 23 Counties, 3 countries and 1 tired but proud family!

A big thank you to all who have supported our fundraising to date especially students at Lucton school who participated 4th July in their own 1000 Mile Challenge.


CCF Annual Camp

CCF Annual Camp – Barry Buddon 2019

The highlight of the CCF Training Year is the annual camp, and this year Lucton School CCF were lucky enough to be sent to Barry Buddon Training Centre, slightly past Dundee, Scotland. So, with passports in hand, proof of inoculation and some hearty packed lunches we set off on our epic coach adventure to the far reaches of the Bonny Wee Scotland; and in answer to your question – yes at times we did take the high road!

The first couple of days were spent carrying out practice and rehearsals of the cadets' low-level tactics - with everything from the obstacle course, casualty extraction, section attacks and being taught Close Quarter Combat (CQB) by a crazy Scottish chap.

The middle of the week was taken up consolidating the training in the form of a 36-hour exercise. Recces were carried out, ambushes set and sprung, enemy defeated. The final phase was an attack on

Equestrian News

The start of the new term also brings the new NSEA programme of competitions and events for our Equestrian Team to focus on. In just the next eight weeks we have dressage qualifiers, Show Jumping qualifiers, the very popular Eventer Challenge being held here at Lucton School which is also a qualifier for Hickstead in May 2020 as well as having six riders preparing and practising for the Show Jumping Championships taking place at Addington in October.

Over the summer, Seren Lloyd has had some fantastic results winning the Intermediate Show Jumping at the Pony Club Area competition plus the Intermediate Team Eventing at Chepstow, she was Individual winner at the Riding Club Show Jumping Areas for Marden, won the team Show Jumping and Eventing Area Competitions, came 7th individually and 6th team at the Riding Club Championships at Swalcliffe.

Hannah Lawry on her new horse Lucky (we hope she will live up to her name!) is also having great success as she won the 80cm Eventer Challenge at Allens Hill, 1st in the dressage at Pudleston Show and had two wins, a 2nd and a 3rd at the Pony Club Team Show Jumping at Herefordshire County Fair.

George Jones on Cleo competed at the Pony Club Area Competitions and came 3rd individually plus a team 1st meaning they qualified for the Pony Club Show Jumping Championships at Rectory Farm. He also had a 1st and 3rd at the Pony Club Team Show Jumping at Herefordshire County Fair.

Jess Lane won the 80cm at Marden Show. She then went on to win the 1m class, 2nd in the 90cm and 3rd in the 80cm at Pudleston Show last weekend.

Many of our other team horse and riders were also out competing and training throughout July and August in preparation for the forthcoming events and many came





home with rosettes, trophies and fantastic results.
