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From the Heads



With a sense of déjà vu, we have once again been required by the government to close the school to most of our students.

We do fully appreciate the importance of lockdown. and absolutely support the government's intention of preventing the spread of the virus through unnecessary social contact, especially given the existence of this new more transmissible variant. This does not mean, however. that our hearts are not heavy at having to comply with the restrictions that have been imposed on us. Like everyone else, our fondest wish is that a successful roll-out of the vaccination will make a return to normal life possible in the

near future.

We contacted all parents at the start of term to inform that that we would be open to the children of critical workers, and we are proud to stand by this; however, in the light of all that has been said about the virus and the threat to both the NHS and care services, and to the wider population, we do have to remind parents respectfully of the specific guidance issued by the government on 5th January, which says; "Children [of critical workers] can go to school or college if required." The clear implication of both "can" (it does not say "should"!) and "if required" is that students who are able to stav at home really ought to do SO.

Naturally, we will do all we can to support the students in their learning at this difficult time. We are committed to teaching the full timetable for each year group, so far as it is possible to do so. Swimming remotely is a bit difficult to manage! Despite technical glitches, we are up and running with remote learning and have already had a number of comments from parents and students commenting positively on our delivery. We thank everyone involved for getting on with this difficult task at a moment's notice. We are also grateful to those who have taken the time to send their supportive comments, but remind parents and students that all staff are working and are on hand to deal with issues or problems. While there will be limits to what we can practically do in some circumstances, we do aim to respond promptly to any problem or suggestion for improvement that is notified to us.

You are no doubt now aware that the summer's public exams have been cancelled. They will be replaced by teacher assessments, although what is to be assessed, how and by when has not been explained to schools, yet. Given the uncertainty, we shall be teaching and learning as

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normal in Years 11 and 13: getting on with the next topic, learning new skills and recapitulating material that has been covered so far, in order to ensure the students are fully prepared for whatever assessments are required. It does seem sensible, however, to put Year 11 and Year 13 mocks on hold until we are clear whether they will be useful in the assessment process, so we envisage that they will be delayed until further notice.

With staff and students on site, safety is naturally our highest priority. To this end, we have whole-heartedly embraced community testing for all staff and for students in Years 7 and above. No-one can say that the procedure is a pleasant one, but the atmosphere in the testing station in the Upper Hall has been lovely; with lots of humour and a great deal of caring support. Best of all, every test so far has been a resounding negative for COVID. A huge vote of thanks goes to all involved, especially Mr Brown who has organised everything so well. We are not complacent, however, and both community testing and, of course, our existing protocols. which proved effective in keeping everyone in school throughout the whole of the Autumn Term, will remain in place for the foreseeable future. With members of the school community sadly having lost loved ones to the virus in the last few weeks. none of us should need reminding of the importance

of "hands, face and space" and all that goes along with this message.

Lucton School Lateral Flow Testing Station

Normally when I start to type these articles it is either to do with CCF or DofE activities with pictures of lovely views of children firing weapons, or crawling in the woods; however, this New Year I will break with tradition.

Tuesday and Wednesday saw us receive a couple of thousand Lateral Flow Testing kits and many boxes of PPE. This was all arranged prelockdown, in order to test all school members, both students and staff: however, in we were, after our first INSET day for staff, to stay at home, adults and children alike, with the exception of critical workers and their children (and of course, school staff). To that end. Tuesday and Wednesday saw a team of Lucton staff undertake a series of online tutorials so that the school can deliver the testing cycle for those students and staff who were on site. After the training, a dress rehearsal was conducted to ensure all testing personnel were competent with their roles and then we were off - Wednesday mainly testing staff before rolling

this out to the students on Thursday.

Although, not the most pleasant of experiences (swabbing your own throat and nose) it was managed by all and thankfully all those tested have been negative - in excess of 100 students and staff combined. We are reminded that we should not be complacent, though, and weekly testing will now be carried out, in line with NHS guidelines.

I personally would like to thank the staff that were "voluntold" they were part of the testing team, for their efforts in completing the training and practice runs, but most of all for the efficiency in which the tests were carried out. Everything from registering the test subjects, through to testing and processing the results - thank you.
