This week, Reception Class have been very lucky to have Annis and her mum share with them via Teams how they celebrate the Chinese New Year.


The children have enjoyed learning about what people might wear, eat and do and they have found out that they were all either born in the year of the goat or the year of the monkey.

Romance is in the air as Valentine's Day approaches and Spring draws nearer.


Romance is one of the

Comic Relief 2021



In addition to our usual cake sales and other fund-raising initiatives for Comic Relief, we have set the audacious challenge of running "virtually" from Lucton to our sister school in Shanghai, China!

Completing the challenge virtually not only means that we won't have to deal with quarantine restrictions but, crucially, when we get there we won't have to run all the way back..

The distance we need to cover is 10,000 km, which is actually slightly further than the distance from here to Shanghai, but which sounds considerably better than the precise distance. For those who crave precision, the actual distance is 9,292.352 km, but what's 707.648 km between friends?

For those of you that shudder at terms like "PB" and "sweatwicking", have no fear. If you prefer, you can walk, swim, cycle, or ride a horse. Whether you are a marathon runner, dog walker, or just want to log your daily trips to and from the fridge, it all counts! The race is open to all students, staff, parents, grandparents, pets, etc. We have some tremendously active families, so if any school can do this it's Lucton.

In order to take part you will need to submit your mileage to Strava. Many of you will be familiar with Strava, but if you haven't used it before it only takes a few minutes to download the app and sign up, and you can submit data from a variety of fitness trackers (watches, mobile apps etc). Once registered, you will be able to join the Lucton School Red Nose Challenge club and begin logging those kilometres! If you absolutely can't use Strava, you can also pass your recorded totals to the Form Teacher: however. it's a lot more fun to track our collective progress digitally.

We will be emailing students and parents next week with






fuller details on how to take part, in addition to a link where you can submit donations should you wish to do so.
