Due to the unbridled enthusiasm of the Lucton community, we have run, walked, cycled, horse ridden, and swam across the North Sea. We shot past Sweden, blazed through Finland, and we now find ourselves on the northern tip of Lake Onega in north-western Russia!

A cursory glance through Wikipedia reveals that Lake Onega is actually the second largest lake in Europe, containing over 1650 islands, the most famous being Kizhi.

Kizhi contains "89 wooden architectural monuments of the 15th and 20th centuries, the most remarkable of those is the Kizhi Pogost of the early 18th century which was included in the list of UNESCO world Heritage sites in 1990."

We won't stick around too long though as it's currently -6c, the gift shop appears to be closed, and the lake is also home to brown bears, wolves, and lynxes.
