With last Friday being Red Nose Day and Mr Warren organising multiple events leading up to the day, the CCF felt it only right to join in.

The events were to be a stretcher race to simulate a casualty evacuation, and a weighted shuttle run/carry to simulate an ammunition resupply. The stretcher race would follow the 1km circuit at school, and the weightedcarry done over a 50m shuttle on the rugby field. Two teams would race in each event, the stretcher weighing 40kg and the simulated ammunition would be two Bergans weighing 20kg each and three 81mm mortar containers, weighing 10kg each (per team). The race would be running for best time and the carry, a continuous run for 15

minutes.

In joint first place of the stretcher race was Sgt Perry's team from Somme Platoon and Sgt Marron's team from Normandy platoon, coming in at 7 minutes, dead. A special mention must go out to LCpl Palfreman who ran the race twice in succession as their second platoon team were

a person down, she stepped in without hesitation to help out – a Stirling effort. All personnel taking part in the stretcher race covered a total of 55km.

Winning the resupply challenge were the RAF Team 2, carrying 1640kg, shuttling 10.4km – a massive effort on their behalf! The total for all teams on

the resupply challenge was a staggering 10,570kg (in excess of 10 tonnes), covering 52km in shuttle runs over the 50m course. Making the total distance covered during the CCF period 107km. An excellent effort from all cadets.

To complete the day a number of promotions to LCpl were made. Maj. Derrigan awarded the following cadets: Archie, Fremah, Lola, Tristan, Evie, Connie, Tara and Annalise. Congratulations from the CCF Staff!
