
Bees!

England Rounders Tournament at Luctonians

The heat is on...!! Quite literally, as the sun rose high in the sky, Lucton's senior rounders team had a baptism of fire when playing England's U17 side in the first round of a tournament hosted by the English national association at Luctonians.

After a hesitant start in the field, the girls gradually settled and became less in awe of the big-hitting England players. Although we lost the first match 18 - 31/2, some tenacious batting from Rachel, Sophie and Catherine kept us in the game. A rest, some tactical discussion and a second match against Lacon Lightnings proved just how resilient the girls are. Superb bowling from Georgia, great catches from Olivia and Jess W, plus slick backstop (Scarlett P) and first post links meant that Molly piled on the pressure with several crucial stumpings, curtailing Lacon to seven rounders; an achievable target.

Lucton set off at pace, with excellent batting from Jess, Scarlett, Catherine and Tiphany as we chipped away at the target and then passed it to amass a match-winning 11½ rounders. Having regained confidence, the next match was extremely close. Lucs Aces batted first and despite tight fielding, three stumpings at first post, and solid catches from Scarlett and Sophie, some late rounders lifted their score to 8½.

We began positively with the batters finding the sweet spot and the gaps in the field. At the half-way stage the tension mounted as we were close to equalling their score and some timely rounders from Jess W and Jess C, plus canny decisions from Rachel, kept us in the game with a crucial rounder scored off the last ball of the match to clinch the game.

Next up was Lady Hawkins.

With confidence high, some outstanding batting and fielding, especially Olivia's three outstanding catches, from the whole team gave us a comfortable 12-4 win. Although the final game against national U15 was always going to be tough, Lucton won praise from the England coaches for their teamwork, both on and off the field. With Molly leading the team in a calm and mature manner, it was so good to see how much they had learnt during the day. Their fielding in this last match was much slicker and Georgia's bowling was first class; hardly a no ball in sight! Whilst England scored 16 rounders, we responded positively, sneaking the guick half rounder as often as possible, speeding around the posts to score a respectable



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seven rounders.

A great performance on a really enjoyable day. To finish third overall against strong opposition was impressive. The girls flew the Lucton flag with pride; Floreat Luctona!


James then raced back to
