On a dull, overcast, yet calm Friday morning, many excited Middle School pupils gathered for a games lesson with a difference: an interform instead of inter-house competition, and they did not disappoint, as competition was intense, especially on the track.

Whilst brothers, James (Yr 8) and Henry (Yr 7) dominated their sprint events, Annabel (Yr 7) was queen of the 800m/1500m, as was Sophie (Yr 8) over 300m in an impressive 47.85sec. There were strong performances from Frankie (Yr 7 100m), Eno (Yr 7 200m) and Amelia (Yr 7 300m) and Ottie (Yr 8 200m), all surpassing expectation for a podium finish.

The Year 6's all tasted victory, with strong performances by Rebecca (200m), Solonge

(800m) and Livia (Triple Jump). With 7B pipping 7W to victory in the Year 7 inter-form event, 8B just, outperformed 8P. Although winning is always a key objective, winners come in many guises and on this occasion, it was the fact every child had the opportunity to compete and feel part of a team. Winning the Victrix or Victor Ludorum is a huge achievement, and Nicholas (Yr 6), Hugo and James (Yr 8) achieved this in style as did Yr 6's Livia and Maddi, Annabel (Yr 7) and Yr 8's Ottie and

Sophie, who all trained hard in the athletics activity sessions. However, equally as important was the sportsmanship that was clearly evident, the mutual support and respect of and for each person's ability as well and the fact that many pupils surprised and surpassed themselves, which makes everyone a winner!

Senior School Sports Day

Although rain stopped play on Monday, after one hundred and five weeks of waiting, the much-anticipated Senior School Sports Day took place on the last day of term.

The new format, inter-form, instead of inter-house was greeted with much enthusiasm, with all pupils playing a key role for their form. With a positive start on the track, some exciting 800m races ensued, with Darcy (Yr 9 Victrix Ludorum winner) setting the tone with a dominant piece of front running to win the Yr 9 race. Equally impressive was Will's timing as he overhauled Grant P-B, the long-time leader, (joint Yr 9 Victor Ludorum winner) with 200m to go, for an emphatic Yr 10 800m victory.

Forbes (Sixth Form Victor Ludorum winner) proved that he has it all, with a strong performance over 800m, followed by a speedy dash for the line over 100 and an excellent Javelin throw of 33m. Equally impressive was Zac, (joint Yr 9 Victor Ludorum winner) who stormed down the 100m, in 12.54 sec, kept enough in the tank to just pip the talented Josh over 200m and then leapt to pole position in the long jump pit.

This was followed by an epic Year 10 boys 100m where Jack and Leo battled for supremacy, matching each other stride for stride, even over the finish line! Jack brimming with confidence went on to win the long jump and was joint Year 10 Victor Ludorum winner with Nathan. Nathan's well-timed victory over 1500m was complemented by consistent jumping, a win in the triple jump and second in the long jump.

Not to be outdone, the Sixth Form boys added to the spice and drama of the longdistance races, with Angus thinking he had the 1500m wrapped up, until Daniel's late charge denied him victory on the finish line, so fine was the margin of victory!

In the field, Tristan dominated the Year 9 boys shot and discus, as did Darcy (Javelin and Long Jump) and Daisy (joint winner of the Year 9 Victrix Ludorum) who added the discus and triple jump titles to her 1500m win, with Fremah joining the party to win the shot.

The dice was spread more

evenly in all Year 10 field events, with Annalise (discus), Evie (shot), Sophie (javelin) and Bella (triple jump) all excelling as did Yara (Year 10 Victrix Ludorum winner) who added the long jump title to her dominant 100m win. Sam and Tom went head to head in the discus and shot, with Sam stronger in the shot and Tom the discus, with Joel pipping 300m victor Ellis, to win the javelin. Gym work and strength conditioning obviously paid off for Reubens C, winner of the 400m and discus and Matthew D, whose speed over 200m was emulated by some nifty footwork to win the shot. Faith P proved that she hadn't lost her touch when winning the Sixth Form javelin and she



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sealed the Victrix Ludorum with a powerful 200m victory and a well-judged 1500m run. With all to play for, the relays were tense affairs, with 10Q clinching both, 9M were convincing winners of the boys and 9D the girls, whilst the Sixth Form managed to put out five teams! Despite their best efforts 9M couldn't quite amass as many points as 9D whilst 10Q managed to win by nine points!
