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### Mr Tyler's Address

"Good evening everyone. I'm Jon Tyler, and I'm delighted to be the new Headmaster of Lucton School, having moved here from Wiltshire with my partner Becky.

The most important thing that I want to say tonight is thank you: thank you for coming, thank you for your support, and I especially appreciate you joining us on what has been a boiling hot day.

It actually brings back some bad memories of my very first day in teaching, when my new Head told the staff that he had just suspended 120 students because they decided they didn't want to go to school during a heatwave. So instead, they decided to go out on the school fields and burn things. And the parents, who were naturally worried about this type of behaviour, wrote in to express their concerns to the Head. But their concerns weren't about the pupils' behaviour; they were concerned by the school's behaviour for not supplying those truanting pyromaniacs with water and sunscreen while they were outside burning things on a hot day. So thank you for being here and not filling my inbox with those kinds of complaints today.

I have to say that I've loved my first few days here. I wasn't

quite sure what to expect, and each day is still full of surprises. This morning, I was chasing a bird out of reception; yesterday, I was trying to find out the identity of Spiderman after a Sixth Former was roaming around the school in a Spiderman mask; but the students have been amazing and there's a lovely, really positive atmosphere around the school.

It's also been really nice to hear from many of you about how the school has helped your sons and daughters, and I'm reminded of something that I was once told when I first got into teaching, which is that there are three incredibly powerful forces in schools: the pupils, the staff and the parents. When we are on the same side, we can achieve great things together, but if only one of those is not then it becomes almost impossible to make real progress.

I feel that right now, we have great pupils, we have caring staff, and we clearly have supportive parents, so I'm really excited about the direction that we're heading in. I'm told that we're also close to raising some funds to develop various aspects of the site, perhaps finally renovating the changing rooms or the music practice rooms.

And on that note, I must say a big thank you to our PTA, the Friends, for all of their work for the school. A special thank you to Jade for running it, to Suzanne for arranging the Joules sale that I'm told was so successful here in July, and of course a huge thank you to all of those who have contributed to such a superb Prep School entrance - especially Nigel, Paul, Chris, and our very own Mr Bicker-Caarten, all of whom have worked tirelessly throughout the summer – so our thanks to them

Our mission now is to provide the absolute best care to your sons and daughters. I said to staff and pupils last week that what I want is for pupils to be happy and to achieve – and in that order.

Academically, we know from a national analysis that we help students to get at least one whole grade better in each subject than they would be expected to get elsewhere, and we're very proud of that, but I care even more about pupils enjoying school.

I want them to want to come to school – quite a radical notion for some teenagers in particular - but I firmly believe that if they enjoy being here, then the learning and the achievement will

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follow, whether that comes academically, in an extracurricular pursuit, or just in becoming a really nice person who develops the confidence and readiness that they need for life after school.

I know the school is not perfect, and I know that there have been some issues in previous years. I will be sending out a questionnaire to ask for your feedback about all of the things that the school does really well - and hopefully you think there are lots of those - as well as the areas that we can develop further.

Please let us know if we can ever help. You can always contact your child's Form Tutor, the Head of School, Deputy Heads, now that Mr Goode and Mrs Niblett have stepped back to their usual roles as Deputy Heads, and you can always get in contact

with myself personally as well. I am determined that every pupil enjoys being here, achieves while being here and that you get the top service that you are paying for.

It's not always going to be smooth sailing and especially as your sons and daughters enter those teenage years, maybe you'll find they're not quite as excited to come in as they once were, maybe their grumbles begin to stack up, but I would ask you to remember the words of one of my former Heads, who used to try to strike a deal with parents. He said:

'If you promise to believe only half of what your kids tell you about us, we promise to believe only half of what your kids tell us about you'.

Seriously, we are here to help and we want pupils to be

proud of being here and we want you to be proud of your choice of schools for them.

As I said at the outset thank you for being here, thank you for your support and please do enjoy the rest of the evening."
