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Year 5 Science Week

Year 5 got thoroughly involved with Science Week this year, carrying out lots of exciting experiments throughout the week including making lava lamps, newspaper structures and more.

We made our own chocolate ice-cream using just milkshake, ice and salt. Mixing ice with salt causes the temperature to drop and allows the ice and salt mixture to get colder than pure water ice. In turn, shaking the bag of milkshake, which is inside the bag of ice and salt mix, allows the mixture to move around for better freezing.

We also looked at rainbow skittles. Skittles are coated in food colouring and sugar and when the children poured water over the skittles, the coloured coating dissolved, spreading



through water and taking on the colour of the skittle.

We finished the week off by creating a "fire snake" that appeared to grow out of nowhere. Setting lighter fluid on fire caused the sugar and baking soda mixture to burn, in turn, causing gas bubbles



which got trapped, resulting in the black "snake" structure that rose out of the flames. A very fun week had by all!

Next up was our junior instructor's cadre where some of our NCO's learnt how to pass on their knowledge to other cadets, this included the methods of instruction used for classroom-based lessons and practical lessons. The staff saw some of our NCO's deliver some fantastic lessons in a very wide-spread range of activities from drumming techniques to super heroes.

A training day at the beginning of March gave us the opportunity to polish up some of the cadets basic fieldcraft and navigation skills, as well as conduct some skill at arms training ready for a green weekend further down the line.

The term was finished off with a training weekend in the Beacons. 36 Cadets enjoyed

an action packed few days in Sennybridge training area.

The Friday evening was spent gathering intelligence pointing us towards urban combat, training on the Saturday led us to the FIBUA village where the cadets learnt how to assault and clear buildings and the importance of team work.

Saturday night was spent with patrols putting their antiambush drill to the test before the final assaults on a radio tower on Sunday morning. This was the first real chance we have had to get out on the ground with blank ammunition in some time and it's safe to

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say the cadets loved every second of it. The contingents NCO's worked exceptionally hard leading their sections through what was a very challenging exercise, and for a change the weather was very kind and we all enjoyed the glorious sunshine.

Our Cadets have continued to work hard towards the Duke of Edinburgh awards and this term has seen an amazing 8 Cadets pass Bronze, 6 Cadets Silver and 3 students along with one member of staff passing their Gold award, a massive congratulations to you all.



A long, but worthwhile trip up the M1 to Worksop College was a great success for Edwin (Year 4) and Annabel (Year 8/9), as both ran strongly and with confidence, in very competitive races, to finish 7th and 5th respectfully.
