Waterworks Museum

The annual Year 6 trip to the Waterworks museum took place on Tuesday 14th June.

Armed with dipping nets, microscopes and identification keys we descended on the pond. Amidst a frenzy of excitement, dozens of wriggling invertebrates were scooped from the pond, examined, identified, and then finally restored unharmed to their habitat before our return to school.

On Sunday 12th June, cadets arrived at the RAF Cosford Airshow quickly spotting the Fairground rides, and after an adrenaline packed start to the day, explored the static displays. The Tiger Moth was a particular favourite where the owner kindly gave us a close up tour. Finally, the flying display started and the cadets settled down to be entertained by a Parachute Display, the Grob Tutor formation, the aircraft in which some of them have already flown, a Spitfire display, the Red Arrows and many more including the finale, the F-35 Lightning. A very enjoyable and inspiring day.

The RAF Section travelled to the Vale of Glamorgan on 28th June. 
Henley competed in the Wyvern League with City of Hereford
